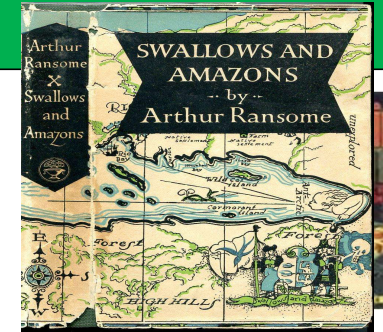

Sticky Knowledge

- The Lake District is a national park in Cumbria in the North West of England.
- The Highest mountain in England (Scafell Pike) is in the Lake District.
- The largest lake in England (Lake Windermere) is in the Lake District.
- Land use means what the land is used for eg. houses, shops, factories or farmland.
- The mountains in the Lake District were formed as volcanoes 450 million years ago.
- The lakes and valleys were formed by glaciers carving them during the last ice age.
- Around 16 million people visit the Lake District every year.
- Activities in the Lake District include: hiking, cycling, sailing and rock climbing.
- Orienteering is an activity where people search for 'markers' using an ordinance survey map.
- Know the ordinance survey symbol for: road, footpath, coniferous trees, non-coniferous trees, school, place of worship and contours.
