English

This half term as writers, we will be focusing on:



Monster Slayer -

Maths



This half term, as mathematicians,

we are going to be focusing on the following: Addition and Subtraction

This unit builds on children's Year 3 work on adding and subtracting with 3-digit numbers. It further develops their estimation and answer-checking strategies and their problem-solving skills. This unit provides essential preparation for beginning to add and subtract numbers with more than four digits. Before they start this unit, it is expected that children:

• have a firm understanding of place value (up to 4-digit numbers)

• know a range of mental addition and subtraction strategies

• can apply these strategies to a range of contexts including measure.

We will focus on using addition and subtraction strategies in reasoning and problem-solving situations.

Measure – area

In this small step, children encounter area for the first time. They learn that area is the amount of space taken up by a two-dimensional shape or surface. They explore different ways of working out the area of a shape,

Multiplication and Division

This unit builds upon the previous work children have done on multiplication and division from Year 3, where children learnt how to multiply by equal grouping and to divide using sharing. This unit also builds upon previous work children have done on addition and subtraction. It also develops children's reasoning skills, which they are developing throughout the year.

RE – Branch 2 – Prophecy and Promise

In this branch, pupils will compare two accounts of the appearance of John the Baptist, noticing what is the same in St Mark and St Matthew's accounts. Alongside physical appearance, both gospel writers draw on the prophet Isaiah, suggesting that the one Isaiah speaks of is fulfilled in the person of John. For Christians, this is true as it is a sign that Jesus is the Messiah. In the gospel accounts, John prepares the way for Jesus' ministry, whereas, in Advent, the figure of John the Baptist asks Christians how they will prepare a way for Jesus in their own lives and at the end of all things.

Were the Anglo Saxons a benefit to Britain?

For our topic learning this half term, we are going to become historians and delve into the history of the Anglo Saxons and their impact on Britain. Here is an outline of our learning for this half term: In **week one**, **as historians**, we will be looking at who were the Anglo Saxons, and why did they Invade Britain?

In **week two, as historians,** we will be researching if Anglo Saxon place names still exist today.

In **week three, as historians,** our focus will be on what was a Saxon village/farm like and how do they differ from today?

In **week four, as historians,** we will be exploring the Anglo Saxon hierarchy.

In **week five, as historians,** we will explore Sutton Hoo and try to figure out it's importance.

In **week six, as historians,** our research will take us down the Anglo Saxon justice system. What did happen to 'naughty' Anglo Saxons?

All our history learning this half term links with the following National Curriculum areas:

Pupils should continue to develop a chronologically secure knowledge and understanding of British, local and world history, establishing clear narratives within and across the periods they study. They should note connections, contrasts and trends over time and develop the appropriate use of historical terms. They should regularly address and sometimes devise historically valid questions about change, cause, similarity and difference, and significance. They should construct informed responses that involve thoughtful

Guided Reading

For our Guided Reading this half term, we are going to be developing our inferential and retrieval skills. As we become more confident with this, we will work towards timed exercises and more independent question answering. We use the ERIC approach to Guided Reading (Explain, Retrieval, Interpret and Choice). To build these skills this half term, we are going to be using Journey to Jo'burg by Beverley Naidoo.




Banned by the apartheid government in South Africa, this is the story of two children's courage and determination to find their mother and bring her home.

Science
